FOCUS AREAS

My research investigates interconnections and influence of popular culture and political possibilities, particularly as they pertain to the creation of a post-capitalist form of desire in the conditions of the Anthropocene. My approach to this builds on my empirical work with climate activists and takes an interdisciplinary approach drawing from an affect theory, post-Deleuzian critical theory and new materialism and drawing on the methodological approaches of cultural studies, sociology, anthropology, media studies and musicology. In my current position at the Department of Management, Society and Communication at Copenhagen Business School, I research the influence of the popular culture genre of climate change fiction on climate change activists using affective ethnographic methodologies to trace the operative force of this genre as empirically observed in organizational practices. The first research paper from this project, coauthored by me and the project's PI, Ana Alacovska, was published by *The Sociological Review*. The second was published this summer in *Ephemera: Theory and Politics in Organization*, with another under the first round of peer review at *Environment and Planning D: Society and Space*. Additionally, I have recently published an audiopaper on the contested political identity of the urban soundscape at *Siesmograf* or a special issue on generic sounds.

My PhD applied the critical theoretical framework of capitalist realism to the affective field of post-financial crisis popular music through the analytic methodology of sonic fiction. This research formed the basis of my book, *Pop Music and Hip Ennui: A Sonic Fiction of Capitalist Realism* published by Bloomsbury Academic in 2019. I have since developed and expanded on this work in chapters for *The Bloomsbury Handbook of Sound Art* (2020), and *The Bloomsbury Handbook of the Anthropology of Sound* (2021) and in a peer-reviewed article for the journal *Periskop* (2022).

As an educator, I have experience in teaching contemporary cultural and social theory, qualitative research methods and organizational politics. At both introductory and advanced levels, my focus is to get students to see the practical relevance of these tools in coming to know more about the world around them and how to act responsibly as they engage with it. To this end, I have developed an effective pedagogical approach that emphasizes student interaction and continuous feedback to allow students to access skills and knowledge that may at first appear to be overly abstract without sacrificing the nuance of these perspectives. Further, my approach highlights for students their role as active participants in culture both in and out of the classroom encouraging a reflective engagement with their education and the power it gives them.

The popular communication of my research has been an important part of my scientific practice and contribution. To that end, I have worked as an editor and commissioning editor for the music criticism platform *Passive/Aggressive* since 2019. In this position, I have commissioned, overseen and contributed explanatory material for the publication of the first Danish translations of work by internationally renowned theorists including Steve Goodman, Mark Fisher and Kodwo Eshun. In my capacity as a member of the editorial board at P/A, I host and produce a podcast Series with the Lake Radio which will explore the contemporary Danish music scene through long-form interviews with practising artists. I have also curated many public events through the non-profit cultural centre *Ark Books* to bring academic work from the humanities into public spaces.
